

Puppy Crate Training Tips

Crate training helps your puppy learn independence, develop good potty habits, and feel secure. Here's a quick reference guide to help you stop your puppy from crying in the crate—using positive, humane methods.

1. Choose the Right Crate

Make sure your puppy can stand, turn, and lie down comfortably. Too much space may lead to accidents.

2. Create Positive Associations

Feed meals in the crate and reward your puppy for entering willingly. Never force them inside.

3. Start with Short Sessions

Begin with a few minutes at a time while you're home, then gradually extend duration.

4. Move to Nighttime Gradually

Keep the crate nearby at night. Respond if your puppy truly needs to go out, but don't open the crate mid-cry.

5. Provide Comfort Items

A soft blanket, safe chew toy, or shirt with your scent can help your puppy relax.

6. Stay Consistent

Follow a regular bedtime routine. Don't give in to whining—wait for calm moments before letting your puppy out.

7. Know When to Seek Help

If your puppy panics, drools, or cries for 30+ minutes nightly, consult a vet or certified trainer for separation anxiety support.

Crate training takes patience and consistency, but it's one of the best investments you can make in your puppy's well-being. Within a week or two, most puppies begin to settle happily into their "den."
